SUMMARY OF REQUEST:

The Henderson County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) has approved funding for local juvenile crime prevention programs. These funds for Fiscal Year 2013-2014 to Fiscal Year 2015-2016 in the amount of \$193,745 are available for this purpose through the State of North Carolina. Each Program is required to provide a 30% match.

The programs approved by the J.C.P.C. are as follows:

7. Hendersonville Boys & Girls Club	\$23,000
Total	\$193,745

Executive Summary

The Henderson County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 12-13 through FY 15-16.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Henderson County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

Priorities for Funding: Through a risk & needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Henderson County.

1. Psychological Assessment
2. Temporary Shelter
3. Interpersonal Skills Building
4. Mediation
5. Restitution/Community Services
6. Mentoring
7. Parent/Family Skills Building
8. Structured Day
9. Tutoring/Academic Enhancement
10. Group Home
11. Runaway Shelter
12. Specialized Foster Care
13. Temporary Foster Care

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions.


Funding Recommendations: Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Public Safety, Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY 13-14 (See JCPC Funding Allocations page) :

- 1 Project Challenge - \$78,858
- 2 Temporary Shelter - \$9,000
- 3 Psychological Assessment - \$4,000
- 4 Mediation/Conflict Resolution & Interpersonal Skill Building – \$47,580
- 5 Hendersonville Boys & Girls Club/Interpersonal Skill Building - \$23,000
- 6 Aspire Structured Day – \$25,000

Part I Risk

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (*represented by percentages which with a star next to them*), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

County Risk Factor Observations: FY 2011 - 2012

R2 Elevated Observation: Number of Undisciplined or Delinquent Referrals at Intake: 54% of assessed youth are on their current referral. 20% have one or more undisciplined or delinquent referrals. 18% of assessed youth have 2 to 3 prior referrals.

R4 Elevated Observations: Prior Assaults: 37% of assessed youth have prior assaults (higher than the state rate for 2yrs). 31% of assessed youth have prior assaults without a weapon (decrease from previous year's rate & higher than the state rate for 2yrs).

R6 Elevated Observation: Known Use – Alcohol, Illegal Drugs: 17% Report some substance abuse and need further assessment, 13% report substance abuse with assessment or treatment needed (higher than the previous year).

R7 Elevated Observation: School Behavior Problems: During the Prior 12 Months. 87% of assessed youth have school behavior problems. 75% of assessed youth have serious to moderate school behavior problems (increase from previous year).

R8 Elevated Observation: Relationships With Peers: 69% of assessed youth lack pro-social peers or have some to regular association with youth involved in delinquent activity (increase from previous year's rate and higher than state rate). 3% report gang activity (increase from previous year's rate but lower than state rate).

R9 Elevated Observations: Parental Supervision: 3% of assessed youth have parents unwilling to supervise (slight increase from previous year's rate & slightly higher than state rate).

Part II. Needs

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (*represented by percentages which with a star next to them*), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

County Elevated Needs Observations: FY 2011-2012

Y1 Elevated Observation: Peer Relationships: 51% of assessed youth have some to regular association with delinquent peers (slightly lower than previous year, but higher than state rate).

Y2 Elevated Observations: School Behavior: 80% of assessed youth have school behavior problems (higher than previous year's rate). 52% of assessed youth have serious school behavior problems. (higher than previous year's rate and state rate).

Y4 Elevated Observations: Substance Abuse: 35% of assessed youth have some substance abuse assessment and some substance abuse treatment (higher than previous year's rate and state rate).

Y6 Elevated Observation: Abuse & Neglect History: 27% of assessed youth have a history of abuse/neglect (slight decrease from previous year's rate, but higher than state rate for 3yrs).

Y8 Elevated Observation: Mental Health Needs: 69% of assessed youth have mental health needs (higher than state rate for 3yrs).

F1 Elevated Observation: Conflict In The Home: 26% of assessed youth have conflict in the home (increase from previous year's rate, and higher than state rate).

F2 Elevated Observations: Family Supervision Skills: 68% of assessed youth have parents with marginal to inadequate supervision skills (slight increase from previous year's rate & higher than the state rate for 3yrs).

F5 Elevated Observation: Family Criminality. 39% of assessed youth that have family members with criminal history (slight decrease from previous year's rate, but higher than state rate). 8% have family with active court supervision or gang involvement (increase from previous year's rate).

The JCPC anticipates funds from the NC Department of Public Safety, Division of Administration, Community Programs section in the amount stated above to fund the program types specified below. Such programs will serve delinquent and at-risk youth for the state fiscal year 2013-2014 beginning on, or after, July 1, 2013. The use of these funds in this county requires a local match in the amount specified above.

The JCPC will consider proposals for the following needed programs:

Proposed program services should target the following risk factors for delinquency or repeat delinquency:

- The elevated number of youth with prior referrals to the juvenile justice system
- The elevated number of youth with prior assaults
- The elevated number of youth with known substance abuse
- The elevated number of youth who have school behavior problems
- The elevated number of youth who lack pro-social peers
- The elevated number of youth who lack adequate parental supervision

Programs should address the following concerns as reported in the Needs Assessments for adjudicated youth:

- Peer Domain: • Elevated levels of association with delinquent peers
- Individual Domain: • An increased rate of abuse/neglect
• Youth need more mental health assessment
• An increased rate of known substance abuse: alcohol and other drugs
- Family Domain: • Elevated number of youth who experience conflict in the home
• Inadequate parent supervision skills
• Elevated number of youth who have family members with a criminal history
- School Domain: • Elevated levels of school behavior problems

Applicants are being sought that are able to address items below:

1. Program services compatible with research that are shown to be effective with juvenile offenders.
2. Program services are outcome-based.
3. The program has an evaluation component.
4. Program services detect gang participation and divert individual

Local public agencies, 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations and local housing authorities are invited to submit applications to provide services addressing the above elements.
