BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS MONDAY, MAY 1, 2017

The Henderson County Board of Commissioners met for a regularly scheduled meeting at 5:30 p.m. in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Historic Courthouse on Main Street, Hendersonville.

CALL TO ORDER/WELCOME

Chairman Edney called the meeting to order and welcomed all in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was provided by County Manager Steve Wyatt.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag was led by Dana Wildcats 4-H Club.

RECOGNITION - KATHLENE BEAM - MISS HENDERSONVILLE 2017

Chairman Edney recognized Miss Hendersonville 2017 Kathlene Beam. He stated Miss Beam is a native of Hendersonville and currently attends Blue Ridge Community College. Her platform is "Education on Anxiety Disorders.

Chairman Edney presented Kathlene Beam with a Certificate of Recognition.

<u>RECOGNITION – KATELYN LEDBETTER – MISS HENDERSONVILLE'S OUTSTANDING TEEN 2017</u>

Commissioner Hawkins recognized Miss Hendersonville's Outstanding Teen 2017 Katelyn Ledbetter. He stated Miss Ledbetter is a native of Hendersonville and an honors student at Hendersonville High School. Her platform is "S.C.A.R. – Self Confident and Remarkable – battling skin disorders and scaring.

Commissioner Hawkins presented Katelyn Ledbetter with a Certificate of Recognition.

SMALL ASSEMBLY EVENT CENTER ON HIGHWAY 191

Thirty people had signed up to speak for informal public comment. Chairman Edney asked the citizens to understand that he, Stan Shelley, Commissioner Hawkins and the County Attorney had met and discussed this and the legalities. This Board has no authority. The way the law is set up the County Board of Adjustments is the Board that would hear anything to do with this item. He welcomed those who had signed up to speak but from a legal standpoint there is no reason or rationale to put this item on the Board's agenda. He asked the speakers to limit their comments to two minutes.

INFORMAL PUBLIC COMMENTS

1. Nancy Kaczer spoke in opposition to the Small Assembly Event Center being built on Highway 191. She asked the Board to see if there was any way to rescind the Special Use Permit.

- 2. Ron Kennedy spoke in opposition to the Small Assembly Event Center. He feels it will ruin the serene and peaceful environment.
- 3. Steve Bagwell is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center. He does not feel the Zoning Board of Adjustment thoroughly evaluated the process.
- 4. Bob Heltman opposes the Small Assembly Event Center at the current location.
- 5. Merry Guy opposed the Small Assembly Event Center and feels that SUP 1504 should be revoked. It will be a disruption of harmony.
- 6. Rev. Gary Letchworth is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 7. Richard Traugott is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 8. Craig Isaacson moved here for tranquility and is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 9. Kathleen Fey is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191 and asked the Board for any help they could provide.
- 10. Deborah Merker is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 11. Barbara Mang is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191 and asked the Board to revoke the Special Use Permit.
- 12. Russell Clemmer lives across the street from the Small Assembly Event Center and is opposed to it. He feels the septic system needs to be reviewed and the Special Use Permit revoked.
- 13. Kristie Grove is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. She feels the tranquility will be lost and asked the Board to review the Special Use Permit.
- 14. Alan Windham is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He feels it will decrease the surrounding area property values.
- 15. Richard Steinbeck is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He asked the Board to revoke the Special Use Permit and protect their safety, health, harmony and values of property.
- 16. Jane Billeooe does not live in the location of the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, but supports her neighbors by opposing it. She asked the Board to do what they can so this doesn't happen again in the future.
- 17. Patrick Zachman is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 18. Georganne Wilkie moved here for tranquil surroundings. She is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.
- 19. James Wilkie did not feel that the expert testimony during the hearing regarding the Small Assembly Event Center was allowed. He is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, and feels it will decrease the property values.
- 20. Candler Willis stated zoning is done to protect citizens. He is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, and asked the Board to revoke the Special Use Permit.
- 21. Stan Shelley is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He feels the information used during the findings was not accurate. He appealed the case and lost twice. It was a bad hearing. Property values will decrease.
- 22. William Thompson is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He lives four (4) miles away and will be able to hear noise from the Event Center. It will drop the values of surrounding property.
- 23. Dan Smith opposes the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, only ½ mile from his property. It is not in harmony with the neighborhood.
- 24. Jane Shelley is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, which backs up to her property.
- 25. Janice Parker is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191, and feels it is different from being across from a school.
- 26. Cathy Johnson is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191.

27. Lane Kasischke is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. It is closer than the school and will be louder.

- 28. Jim Lillard is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He does not feel it should be located in a residential area and asked the Board to use any influence they could to revoke the Special Use Permit.
- 29. Judith Scruggs is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. She also feels Hendersonville High School is another example of poor governing.
- 30. John Burgin is opposed to the Small Assembly Event Center on 191. He does not live around 191 but feels rules are not being followed. He asked that the Special Use Permit be revoked.

Commissioner Statements

Commissioner Hawkins stated the appellate process for the Zoning Board of Adjustment is the Superior Court, and from Superior Court to the Appellate Court in which Stan Shelley has followed to the letter. He questioned if the citizens understood that the Board of Commissioners are not able to overturn two court rulings. However, there have been a number of issues raised here that need to be further explored. He asked the Board have staff look into some of the issues so that we have a better understanding of whether or not all parameters laid down are being fully implemented.

Chairman Edney was in support of the request. Staff will be asked to make a comprehensive review of our Zoning Ordinance with any potential recommendations to go to the Planning Board, which is the Board that makes review before being submitted to the Board of Commissioners.

Commissioner Messer agreed that commercial should not be in R2 zoning. Zoning has been done at the request of citizens through small area planning. Staff will review and try to fix it so it doesn't happened again.

Commissioner Thompson supports the request. He feels that what happens often is that the community is very complacent until such a time that something hits them in the face, and suddenly there is a problem. He suggested that citizens be more active in what is going on in your area.

Commissioner Lapsley lives within a mile of the site. This Board's only involvement is the appointment of members of the Zoning Board of Adjustment. The whole intent of the County Ordinance with these type matters is to attempt to push what may appear to be a political decision away from this body to an appointed body that would not be influenced by some kind of political situation that the Commissioners fine themselves in. Commissioner Lapsley was not aware of the decision until after the hearings were done. This Board was notified by our Attorney that there was a legal action pending, we were advised for legal reasons not to get involved and stay out of it. It was not a decision that this commission had any involvement with. After the Courts made their decisions he did have the opportunity to meet with Mr. and Mrs. Shelley and discuss it. He also was shocked at the decision made by the Zoning Board of Adjustment. Commissioner Lapsley is in support of the recommendation to review this further to see if there is any way to make an adjustment to what has happened.

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion that the Board directs staff to look into the full compliance with this Special Use Permit and any areas not in compliance, take appropriate action for the results of whatever they find.

Chairman Edney stated the Board is shocked and dismayed and how this could have happened. What the Board can do at this point is go back and try to make sure it doesn't happen again. A number of folks said this will affect their personal property values. There is a mechanism in our walls to address that called the Board of Equalization and Review. Any property owners who feels their property is being assessed too high has the absolute right to appear before a board of fellow citizens and try to have that value reduced. There is

a specific time limit as to that. Today is the first day they have met this year. They will adjourn as far as taking applications from folks on Monday, May 22nd at 5:00 p.m. So if anyone believe that their property values are assessed to high by this County, you've got until 5:00 p.m. May 22nd to file an application with the Board of Equalization and Review to have it reviewed.

All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Discussion/Adjustment of Consent Agenda

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to approve Consent Agenda with the addition of a Resolution paying tribute to the Vagabond Players 80th Anniversary. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

County Financial Report/Cash Balance Report - March 2017

The March 2017 County Financial Report and Cash Balance Report were provided for the Board's review and approval.

The following are explanations for departments/programs with higher budget to actual percentages for the month of March:

- Register of Deeds contracted services for document image conversion and scanning services
- Information Technology contracted services payments for existing computer technology
- Emergency Management the purchase of capital outlay equipment in the approved budget
- EMS the purchase of four new ambulances in the approved budget
- Rescue Squad vehicle repair costs incurred to be reimbursed by the Squad to the County
- Agri-Business excess operating expenditures over \$120,000 that will be covered by Agri-Business membership fees

The YTD deficit in the 911 Emergency Communications Fund is due to a timing delay in receipt of the monthly NC 911 PSAP Surcharge revenue for February and March. These funds will be received in April and May.

The YTD deficit in the Emergency Services Headquarters, the Law Enforcement Training Center and Hendersonville High School Projects is due to the payment of architect fees for these projects from appropriated fund balance in the Capital Projects Funds that will be reimbursed from future financings.

The YTD deficits in the Detention Center and Recreation Parks Improvements Projects are being paid from appropriated fund balance in the Capital Projects Fund from proceeds received from the sale of the Bent Creek property as approved in the FY2017 budget.

The YTD deficit in the Westfeldt Park Project from project expenditures to date will be reimbursed from grant funds appropriated in the budget for FY2017. The remaining project reimbursement due will be received prior to the end of the current fiscal year.

The YTD deficit in the Cane Creek Water & Sewer District Fund is due to capital outlay expenditures incurred on the Mill Pond Creek Sewer Project that is being paid from appropriated retained earnings in the Fund.

DSS UPDATE – FAMILY CENTERED TREATMENT

The Department of Social Services provided informational updates to the Board of Commissioners regarding various Social Services issues. The May 2017 update, provided by DSS Board Member Dr. Jennifer Hensley, provided an informational presentation regarding the on-going Family Centered Treatment program conducted through DSS in partnership with SPARC and the Family Centered Treatment Foundation.

- Treat Families with Dignity and Respect
- Treatment that is Relevant and Useful



Engaging the family We must connect before we can correct



- Privilege; not a right to be in their home
- Treatment and change is their choice
- Respect and dignity integral to the process
- This process is done "with" them; not "to" or "for" them

What is meant by "sustainable change"?



When achieved, sustainable change helps a family move from making conscious "efforts to change" to establishing a new, accepted "way of living".

- HOW does IT WOIK?

 ▶ With the whole family as defined by the family that their home on days of the week and
- Session schedules get the clinician involved during the most troublesome and difficult times and as
- Provides 24/7 on call crisis support for the family with their known clinical staff. (not a universal on call system)
 Multiple hour sessions several times per week become the norm for creating change.
- ▶ Provides opportunities for the family to practice functioning differently. These weekly "enactments" are integral to the process. (not just talk therapy)



TAX DEPARTMENT SOFTWARE UPDATE

Darlene Burgess stated at the April 3, 2017 meeting, the Tax Administrator provided the Board with an update on issues with the tax software package, the North Carolina Property Tax System (NCPTS). Farragut is the vendor that provides ongoing implementation and support services to users of the system. Based on the issues brought forward at that meeting, the Board requested an additional update at this meeting.

Staff has been working with Farragut on issues related to that transition, and provided the Board with an update on the current status of the project.

AT THE CONCLUSION OF OUR LAST UPDATE ON APRIL 3, 2017, THE COUNTY MANAGER POSED THE FOLLOWING QUESTION:

Are you confident that the software will allow the County to facilitate a successful 2019 Reappraisal?

WHAT TYPES OF ISSUES ARE WE EXPERIENCING?

- At the April 3 meeting, we reported a total of 77 unresolved issues.
- Now, there are approximately 100 unresolved issues.
- The number of issues has increased because (1) more issues have been identified as we move forward with our daily business processes; and (2) observation of issues by Farragut's onsite Project Manager.
- ➤ Issues are categorized as "Critical", "Major" or "Minor"
 - > "Critical" issues materially impede the operation of the entire software or major portions of the County's business operations and a workaround* is not available
 - > "Major" issues have a substantial impact on business processes and a workaround* is available or the function can be completed on a limited basis
 - > "Minor" issues have a minor impact on business processes or may be enhancement requests
- * A "workaround" is a temporary way to circumvent a software issue until a permanent fix is implemented.

THE ANSWER TO THE COUNTY MANAGER'S QUESTION POSED ON APRIL 3, 2017:

NO. At this time we cannot state that we have confidence in the ability of our current CAMA system to perform functions necessary to achieve a successful 2019 Reappraisal.

WHAT STEPS WILL THE TAX DEPARTMENT TAKE TO IMPROVE THE SITUATION? Reallocation of Staff to ensure adequate Reappraisal staffing

- > Two vacant positions are being reallocated from another Tax Department Division, to the Real Property Appraisal Division. These two positions will be Real Property Appraisal I positions, and will enable appraisal staff to visit new construction, process sales and review parcels for the purpose of Reappraisal.
- One position currently within the Real Property Division will be dedicated to clerical duties typically performed by each individual appraiser. This will increase time available for actual appraisals and will also bring a greater level of consistency with data entry of appraisal information.

Mandatory participation in training provided by Farragut

- > Training will be tailored based on input from staff.
- > Testing will occur following training session to confirm employee comprehension.

Tax Department Administration will present a Reappraisal Plan in the near future

- The Plan will include the focus of the Reappraisal, a timeline for the completion of each step required and the resources that will be dedicated to administering the Reappraisal.
- > The Reappraisal Plan will also be forwarded to the Department of Revenue for review and comment.

AT A MINIMUM, WHAT DO WE NEED FROM THE VENDOR?

Adherence to targeted completion dates for Milestones.

- ➤ An example of a targeted completion date for a task is the generation of 2017 value change notices. Notices are typically mailed in February. System issues have prevented the Notices from being mailed until April/May. They are being sent in two batches because of system issues.
- > Targeted completion dates have been established for identified Milestones, including the billing of annual tax bills, which usually occurs during July of each year. Our CAMA system must be reliable in order to maintain our annual cycle and to provide the service our taxpayers deserve.

Adequate training and problem resolution for staff.

- > On-site instruction of staff.
- Reference material for the system's functions (user's manual, quick reference guides, etc.)

Ongoing support to complete tasks necessary for the 2019 Reappraisal.

- Ensure that analytical tools (queries, statistical analysis tools, etc.) are working properly
- > Provide assistance to staff in the proper operation of these tools

An unwavering commitment to fix all system issues completely and in a timely manner.

- Establish a schedule for completing tasks that will allow time to perform Reappraisal tasks
- Do not deviate from the schedule

WHAT ARE OUR OPTIONS?

OPTION A:	 Continue to work with our software vendor, Farragut, on a fast-track basis and in an intensive manner to resolve all issues and receive ongoing Reappraisal support. Provide periodic progress reports to the Board and County Management. If targeted completion dates are not met for reappraisal tasks in enough time to sufficiently complete Reappraisal tasks, revisit the issue. If the issue must be revisited, ramifications affecting the 2019 Reappraisal must be
	considered.
OPTION B:	Consider a change in vendors immediately, and include consideration of ramifications resulting from a vendor change at this point in time.

Commissioner Lapsley asked what the termination conditions were in the contract and were there any time limits for the vendor to complete their work.

Mrs. Burgess responded she did not know.

Commissioner Lapsley asked Manager Wyatt if there was any State regulation requiring that the reevaluation be done in 4 years.

Mr. Wyatt said no it could be done in the 5th year if the Board decided to delay.

Commissioner Hawkins, referring to the County Manager for verification, stated that Henderson County under State Statutes is obligated to do reappraisals every 8 years, but voluntarily does it every 4 years.

County Manager Steve Wyatt responded this is correct.

Commissioner Hawkins feels that worst case scenerio and we can't meet the deadlines, there is nothing in the State Statutes that penalizes Henderson County if it is pushed out a year. He asked what incentive Farragut has to meet the deadlines? What do we do if they don't?

Darlene Burgess stated we do have a contract and the County Attorney is reviewing. She was not aware if there were any ramifications or any penalties within the contract.

County Manager Steve Wyatt stated this meeting has not gone unnoticed by 99 other counties in this state and is an incentive to the contract. These folks are in the business of developing a software program, selling it, and helping counties implement it to do the same thing in this state. They do not have 99 other contracts. There are a handful of other vendors offering software. Other counties have contacted Mr. Wyatt looking for software vendors and products like this. They are aware of what we are doing in open session. This is a critical issue about fundimental fairness of Government. Government has the ability to tax and the law says it will be done in a fair manner. The Reevaluations purpose is only one...fairness or equity. The other County Managers are very much aware of the situation going on in this county. This vendor is going to be under a microscope if the Board decides to push forward with them through the evaluation process. Whatever decision is made, folks will be aware of it and there will be ramifications for this. The NCACC (North Carolina Association of County Commissioners) is a partner, as he understands it, of the NC property Tax System, NCPTCS.

Commissioner Hawkins stated if you go from 77 problems to over 100 in less than a month, that's unacceptible.

Commissioners Messer and Thompson have faith and confidence in the Tax Department to work through it.

Chairman Edney stated the Board of Equalization and Review can accept appeals until they adjourn. He suggested perhaps that Board could accept applications until they actually adjourn, and don't adjourn until Darlene Burgess is in a position to take care of our citizens needs.

Darlene Burgess confirmed that he was asking to delay the adjournment of the Board of Equalization and Review.

Chairman Edney responded yes.

Commissioner Lapsley stated in 30 days when this Board meets again he would like for the County Attorney to provide a summary of all the contract obligations and responsibilities associated with Farragut.

METROPOLITAN SEWERAGE DISTRICT REPRESENTATION - ADD ON

County Attorney Steve Wyatt stated House Bill 764 was introduced on April 11, 2017, and proposes to expand the membership of the Metropolitan Water and Sewerage District to allow for representation by political subdivisions within the district, who do not currently have members on the Board. HB 764 has passed the House, and was sent to the Senate on April 26, 2017. It has subsequently passed the first reading

in the Senate, and been referred on to committee. The Board of Commissioners is requested to discuss the membership expansion provisions of HB 764, and direct staff accordingly.

The Board has been discussing this issue for several years. As legislation make its way through legislature there will be an opportunity for the Board to make a decision about joining in MSD. Representative McGrady is pushing for representation of three members on the MSD Board chosen by the Henderson County Board of Commissioners. There will be some details to work out should be legislation pass, and should the Board of Commissioners decide to pursue merger or consolidation. Those issues could be addressed over some period of time such as the prioritization of lines, equalization of rates, and equalization of service. The Cane Creek Water and Sewer District Capital Facilities Plan and Fund Balance are also critical issues.

Commissioner Lapsley feels the Board needs to be ready to move by early June to participate. It is an option.

Chairman Edney feels a draft report needs to be completed showing funds on hand and how it should be used in our capital plan. He requested that staff draft conditions and bring them back to the Board.

County Manager Steve Wyatt stated a Statement of Intent should be sent to the Legislature and MSD. He directed staff to do research.

Commissioner Edney made the motion that the Board express intent to the Legislature and MSD. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORT

County Manager Steve Wyatt reminded the Board that May 17, 2017 will be an all day worksession on the budget. He is not expecting a tax increase.

May 10, 2017, Secretary Trogdon will be in the Community Room at 9:00 a.m.
