SUMMARY OF REQUEST:

The Henderson County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) has approved funding for local juvenile crime prevention programs. These funds for Fiscal Year 2016-2017 to Fiscal Year 2019-2020 in the amount of \$199,188 are available for this purpose through the State of North Carolina. Each Program is required to provide a 30% match.

Executive Summary

The Henderson County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY <u>16-17</u> through FY <u>19-20</u>.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors, which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Henderson County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

<u>Priorities for Funding:</u> Through a risk & needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Henderson County.

- 1. Temporary Shelter
- 2. Restitution/Community Services
- 3. Psychological Assessment
- 4. Interpersonal Skills Building
- 5. Mediation
- 6. Mentoring
- 7. Parent/Family Skills Building
- 8. Experiential Skills
- 9. Tutoring/Academic Enhancement
- 10. Structured Day
- 11. Group Home
- 12. Runaway Shelter
- 13. Vocational Skills

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions.

<u>Funding Recommendations:</u> Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Public Safety, Division of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY <u>17-18 (See JCPC Funding Allocations page)</u>:

- 1 Project Challenge \$75,188
- 2 Temporary Shelter \$4,000
- 3 Psychological Assessment \$2,000
- 4 Mediation/Conflict Resolution & Interpersonal Skill Building \$42,000
- 5 Hendersonville Boys & Girls Club/Interpersonal Skill Building \$30,000
- 6 Aspire Structured Day \$41,000

The JCPC further recommends that the following amount be allocated from the NC DJJ funds for the administrative costs of the Council for FY 17-18: \$ 5,000

Part I. Risk

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence. 173 Assessments Total

County Risk Factor Observations: FY 2015 - 2016

R0 Overall Risk Level – Observations: 71% of assessed youth are low risk for future delinquent behavior (higher than state rate for past 2 years) 20% are medium risk for future delinquent behavior.

R1 Age for First Delinquent Offense Alleged in a Complaint – Elevated observations: 86% of assessed youth are age 12 or older for first delinquent offense (increase from previous year's rate and higher than state rate.)

R2 Number of Undisciplined Referrals at Intake – Elevated Observations: 39% of assessed youth have prior referrals (increase from previous year & higher than state). 12% of assessed youth have four or more prior referrals (increase from previous year & higher than state). 19% of assessed youth have one prior referral (increase from previous year & higher than state).

R3 Most Serious Prior Adjudication – Elevated Observations: 20% of assessed youth have prior adjudications (increase from previous year & higher than state rate). 4% of assessed youth have prior class f-1 felonies or a1 misdemeanor adjudications (increase from previous years' rate).

R4 Prior Assaults – Elevated Observations: 23% of assessed youth have prior assaults (increase from previous years rate and higher than state rate.) 3% of assessed youth were involved in an affray (increase from previous years rate).

R5 Runaway from Home or Placement – Elevated observations: 16% of assessed youth are runaways from home or placement (3 year increase trend and higher than the state rate).

R6 Known Use – Alcohol, Illegal Drugs (prior 12 months) - Elevated Observations: **18% of assessed youth have substance abuse issues and need assessment (increase from previous year's rate). **16% of assessed youth have substance abuse issues and need assessment/treatment is needed (decrease from previous year, but higher than state).

R7 School Behavior Problems (prior 12 months) - 86% of assessed youth have school behavior problems (increase from previous year's rate and higher than state rate the past 4 years). 32% of assessed youth have moderate school behavior problems (three year increase trend).

R8 Relationships With Peers - Elevated observations: 47% of assessed youth lack pro-social peers (increase from previous year's rate and higher than state rate). 18% of assessed youth regularly associate with others involved in delinquent activity (decrease from previous years but higher than state).

R9 Parental Supervision – Elevated Observations: 20% of assessed youth have parents willing but unable to supervise (2 years increase trend and higher than state rate).

Priority Risks observed by council: R1, R2, R6, R7, R8

Part II. Needs

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

County Elevated Needs Observations: FY 2015 -2016

Y0 Overall Needs Level – Observations: 41% of assessed youth have medium to high level intervention needs (decrease from previous year's rate but higher than the state's rate.)

Y1 Peer Relationships: Elevated Observation: 46% of assessed youth sometimes to regularly associate with delinquent peers (2 year increase trend and higher than the state rate). 18% of assessed youth associates regularly with delinquent peers (increase from previous years rate and higher than state).

Y2 School Behavior/Adjustment: Elevated Observations: 45% of assessed youth have serious school behavior problems (increased from last year and higher than the state rate past two years.)

- **Y3 Academic Functioning:** Elevated Observations: 28% of assessed youth are functioning below grade level (3 year increase trend and higher than state rate for the first time in 3 years).
- Y4 Substance Abuse Within the Past 12 Months: Elevated Observations: **32% of assessed youth have substance use/abuse issues (increase from the previous year's rate and lower than the state rate).
- Y5 Juvenile Parental Status Observations: 100% of assessed youth are not in Parental Status (higher than state rate).
- Y6 Abuse Neglect History: Elevated Observation: 33% of assessed youth are victims of abuse and/or neglect (2 year increase trend and higher than the state rate the past 4 years). 8% of assessed youth are victims of abuse with no support reported (2 year increase trend and higher than state rate the past 4 years).
- Y7 Sexual Behaviors During past 12 Months: Elevated Observations: 11% of assessed youth have dangerous sexual practices (3 year increase trend and higher than the state rate the past 3 years).
- Y8 Mental Health Needs: Elevated Observation: 38% of assessed youth need more mental health assessment (decrease from previous year but higher than state rate for past 4 years).
- **Y9 Basic Physical Needs/Independent Living:** Elevated Observations: 9% of assessed youth are living in Temp Residence & needs met (3 year increase trend). 1% of assessed youth are living with Parent & needs are unmet (increase from previous year and higher than state.)
- **Y10 Health and Hygiene (Exclude Mental Health Conditions)** Elevated Observations: 13% of assessed youth have health/hygiene problem but are unimpaired (2 years increase trend and higher than the state rate for the first time in 4 years.)
- F1 Conflict in the Home within Past 12 Months Elevated Observations: **4% of assessed youth have domestic violence in the home (2 year increase but lower than the state rate). 24% of assessed youth have conflict in the home (decrease from previous year but higher than the state rate).
- **F2 Family Supervision Skills:** Elevated Observations: 5% of assessed youth have inadequate supervision skills (3 year increase trend and higher than the state rate past two years).
- **F3 Disability of Parent/Guardian** Elevated Observations: 6% of assessed youth have parent/guardian with disabilities noted (3 years increase trend and higher than state rate for past 2 years.)
- F4 Substance Abuse by Family Member within Past 3 Years: Elevated Observations: **12% of assessed youth have family members with substance abuse issues (decrease from previous year but higher than state rate past two years).
- **F5 Family Criminality:** Elevated Observations: 37% of assessed youth that have family with criminal history (increase from previous years rate).
