BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 2017

The Henderson County Board of Commissioners met for a regularly scheduled meeting at 9:00 a.m. in the Commissioners' Meeting Room of the Historic Courthouse on Main Street, Hendersonville.

CALL TO ORDER/WELCOME

Chairman Edney called the meeting to order and welcomed all in attendance.

INVOCATION

The invocation was provided by John Mason of Main Street Baptist Church.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Pledge of Allegiance to the American Flag was led by Commissioner Hawkins.

RECOGNITION IN APPRECIATION - Tom Staufer

The Board of Commissioners recognized Thomas Staufer, who has served as Henderson County's Building Services Director since August 9, 2004. Mr. Staufer will be retiring at the end of November, and his last day with Henderson County will be December 1, 2017.

County Manager Steve Wyatt stated Mr. Staufer has brought tremendous confidence and integrity to the County. He is wonderful at helping citizens resolve issues.

The Board thanked Mr. Staufer for his service and presented him with a plaque.

PUBLIC HEARING - Rezoning Application #R-2017-05

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to go into public hearing regarding Rezoning Application #R-2017-05. All voted in favor and the motion carried.


Planner Allen McNeill stated Rezoning Application #R-2017-05, which was initiated on August 28th, 2017, requests the County rezone approximately 1.48 acres of land (thereafter the "Subject Area"). Planning Staff finds no technical restriction to the Subject Area being rezoned from Estate Residential (R-40) zoning district to a Local Commercial (LC) zoning district. The Subject Area is located off Grandview Lane at the intersection of South Rugby Road. The owner of the Subject Area is Mr. Charles Snead & Mrs. Susan Snead.

The Henderson County Planning Board considered rezoning application #R-2017-05 at its regularly scheduled meetings on October 19, 2017. During this meeting the Planning Board voted unanimously to send forward a favorable recommendation to rezone the Subject Area to a Local Commercial (LC).

Before taking action on the application, the Board of Commissioners must hold a public hearing. In accordance with §42A-303 and §42A-346 (C) of the Henderson County Land Development Code and State Law, notices of the November 15, 2017, public hearing regarding rezoning application #R-2017-05 were published in the Times-News on November 2, 2017 and November 9, 2017. The Planning Department sent notices of the hearing via first class mail to the owners of properties adjacent to the Subject Area on October 26, 2017 and posted signs advertising the hearing on the Subject Area on October 27, 2017.




County Context




Aerial Photo Map

Public Input
There was none.

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion to go out of public hearing. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Hawkins made the motion that the Board adopt the resolution regarding the consistency with the CCP. He further moved that the Board approve rezoning application #R-2017-05 to rezone the Subject Area to a Local Commercial (LC) zoning district based on the recommendations of the Henderson County 2020 Comprehensive Plan and other supporting information. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

INFORMAL PUBLIC COMMENTS

- Cindy Ward is a native and lives on Kanuga Road. It is a beautiful area. She feels the NCDOT should
 continue the rumble strips and not put in a round-about, use synchronized lighting and lower the speed
 limit to 35 mph, which will not disturb the environment. The neighborhood has seen an increase in
 patrolling of the area. Ms. Ward provided a petition with 1174 signatures to the Board, and requested a
 copy of the letter that will be sent to the NCDOT.
- 2. Bonnie Sherrill is a Kanuga Road resident. She asked the Board to help preserve the historic and beautiful areas of Henderson County. NCDOT is targeting the Kanuga Road area and will ruin its beauty.
- 3. Dennis Justice is concerned with the safety of children using the artificial turf without the use of shock pads. He feels brain damage from blunt force to the helmet on turf without shock pads is evident. He asked the Board to please make sure Hendersonville High School's turf has shock pads.

Commissioner Hawkins suggested that citizens in the Kanuga Road area look at their deeds to see if NCDOT has a right-of-way to their property.

Commissioner Lapsley stated many citizens had attended the Transportation Advisory Committee meetings. He, John Dockendorf and Steve Carriker have spoken with NCDOT engineers with concerns and have another meeting set up. NCDOT has heard the concerns and hopefully may consider modifying the proposed changes to Kanuga Road.

Chairman Edney explained if the deeds did not show clear right-of-ways, condemnation procedures would be necessary, which is much more expensive.

Tax Collector's Report

Deputy Tax Collector Luke Small had presented the Tax Collector's Report to the commissioners dated November 3, 2017 for information only. No action was necessary.

Vaya Health - Quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report for the period ended September 30, 2017

N.C.G.S. 122C-117(c) requires the staff of the local area mental health authority to provide the County Finance Officer with the quarterly Fiscal Monitoring Report (FMR) within 30 days of the end of the quarter. The County Finance Officer is then required to provide the FMR to the Board of Commissioners at the next regularly scheduled meeting of the board. The FMR for Vaya Health was received by the County Finance Director on October 31, 2017.

Motion:

I move that the Board of Commissioners approves the Vaya Health Fiscal Monitoring Report for the quarter ended September 30, 2017.

Set Public Hearing Regarding Close Out for Habitat for Humanity Dodd Meadows CDBG 2012 N.C. Catalyst Grant (12-C-2469)

Henderson County was awarded the 2012 N.C. Catalyst grant in the amount of \$454,960 on behalf of Henderson County Habitat for Humanity's Dodd Meadows neighborhood located off Crest Road. The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds supported development for moderate and low-income persons in the County. Up to \$250,000 of the grant funds was used on road improvements; including paving, curbing, and storm water drainage improvements, as well as, public water and sewer extension for a portion of phase two of the Dodd Meadows project. Up to \$250,000 was used to fund the construction of a community center within the Dodd Meadows development that serves the Dodd Meadows neighborhood as well as the broader community.

No local match (County funds) was required for this grant. Henderson County Habitat for Humanity had to provide a match of \$790,440 per the grant application, and have provided over 1 million in matching funds for this section of Dodd Meadows.

The NC Department of Commerce requires public hearings as part of its CDBG programs. To complete the grant program, Henderson County is required to hold a close out public hearing to receive public comments concerning the grant prior to completion.

Motion:

I move the Board set a public hearing to close out the CDBG 2012 N.C. Catalyst Grant for Dodd Meadows for Monday, December 4, 2017 at 5:30 P.M.

Budget Amendment - Asset Forfeiture Fund Transfer

The Sheriff's Department is requesting that the Board approve the BA to transfer additional funds from the US Treasury (114431-451004) account for the purchase of Ford Interceptor vehicles to be assigned to our VIP Unit.

November 15, 2017

At the BOC meeting held on October 18, 2017, Commissioners expressed concern that our agency budget amendment recommended Nissan Rogue vehicles for purchase and use in our Volunteer Unit. Commissioners requested our agency look into American made models as an alternative. That resulted in subsequent discussion within our agency leading us to recommend purchase of two Ford Interceptor vehicles instead. The vehicles will be assigned to the VIP Unit as originally requested, however, if the need arises during an emergency or other unforeseen situations we could transfer the police rated vehicles to a sworn officer for emergency operation.

Motion:

I move the Board of Commissioners approve the Budget Amendment to appropriate funding necessary to purchase this equipment.

<u>CANE CREEK WATER AND SEWER DISTRICT – CONSENT AGENDA</u>

Chairman Edney made the motion that the Board convene as Cane Creek Water & Sewer District Board. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Chairman Edney made the motion to adjourn as the Cane Creek Water & Sewer District Board and reconvene as the Henderson County Board of Commissioners. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Commissioner Thompson made the motion to adopt the discussion agenda minus "416 Jackson Road Nuisance Case – Chronic Violater", to be added to a future agenda. All voted in favor and the motion carried.

Bid Award for Purchase of Sheriff Patrol Vehicles - pulled for discussion

The Board is requested to approve the low bid and authorize the Sheriff to proceed with purchasing seventeen (17) 2018 Ford Utility Police Interceptor Vehicles. Bidding was conducted between October 23 and October 30, 2017. The bidder with the lowest overall cost was Asheville Ford for a total price of \$482,000.76.

All seventeen (17) vehicles were approved as part of the Sheriff's Fiscal Year 2018 budget and meet the Henderson County Vehicle Replacement Plan criteria. The Board is requested to accept the low bid from Asheville Ford and authorize the Sheriff to proceed with the purchase.

Chairman Edney explained that the bid awards were not in Henderson County, but were local. The bids came in below budget.

Commissioner Thompson noted that efforts were made to purchase American made vehicles.

Chairman Edney made the motion that the Henderson County Board of Commissioners to accept the low bid from Asheville Ford for seventeen 2018 Ford Vehicles and authorize the Sheriff to proceed with the purchase. All voted in favor and the motion carried

HENDERSON COUNTY AUDIT RESULTS FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 2017

Mr. Joe Haney, CPA, Audit Manager with our external audit firm, Martin Starnes and Associates, CPAs, P.A. provided a brief executive summary presentation on the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017 audit results. Mr. Haney and Carey McLelland, Finance Director were available to answer any questions the Board of Commissioners and Management had regarding the results of the audit.

Carey McLelland stated the Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR) and Compliance Letters have not received final approval from the Local Government Commission (LGC) as required and have not been finalized for print prior to the agenda deadline for this meeting. Staff does not expect any substantive changes to the report. However, our external auditors and staff will report back to the Board and Management should any substantive changes occur after the LGC has reviewed the County's report. Final bound copies of the report will be provided to the Board and Management as soon as they have been printed and received.

The final report will also be placed on the County's website for the public to view and placed in the main branch of the public library.

The audit results for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2017 was presented as information to the Board of Commissioners and Management. No Board action is being requested or required.

There is approximately \$12.7 million dollars in unassigned Fund Balance above the Board's 12% Policy level.

NOTE: The BOC Policy of 12% is calculated by taking actual expenditures plus actual transfers out and multiplying by 12%, whereas unassigned Fund Balance is total Fund Balance less non-spendable, restricted, committed, and assigned (including assigned for subsequent years expenditures).

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Commissioner Lapsley would like to see a report in order to study the numbers. The Fund Balance will increase by \$5,409,575. A great portion is unassigned. We need to consider giving the tax payers some relief.

Mr. Haney stated the Audit Report is in the final stages to the LGC and they should have it in the next couple of weeks.

WHEREAS, the Board desires to update and revise the regulations of the LDC; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Director and Planning Board provided recommendations regarding the proposed zoning map amendment with case #R-2017-05; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.C. General Statute §153-323, the Planning Director provided the prescribed public notice and the Board held the required public hearing on November 15, 2017; and

WHEREAS, N.C. General Statute §153-341 requires the Board to adopt a statement of consistency with the County Comprehensive Plan (CCP); and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Henderson County Board of Commissioners as follows:

- 1. That the Board reviewed the proposed map amendment (#R-2017-05) and finds that it is reasonable, in the public interest and it is consistent with the CCP and the Growth Management Strategy located therein; and
- 2. That the Board determines that the proposed map amendment provides for the sound administration of the LDC while balancing property rights and promoting reasonable growth within the County; and
- 3. That this Resolution shall be retained in the Office of the Clerk to the Board of Commissioners.
